Patrick Brendan Pelan, born in Belfast, Ireland to Mom Lucy Pelan, Dad Alexander Pelan (an accomplished violinist) and two sisters Rosemary and Patricia immigrated to New York when he was four. They settled in Takoma Park, MD, where three additional daughters were born into the family: Dolores, Maureen and Marian. Brendan, married to wife Diane, presently lives in Scaggsville, MD.

He has been performing music in the Washington/Baltimore area since 1963. He was singer and bass man in his band, The Majestic Neons, who released a record "My Baby Don't Love Me" locally in the Washington, DC and Maryland area. The band was showcased by an invitation to perform at the 1965 New York City World's Fair, United States Pavilion. His musical career continues today as a solo guitarist and singer for many Irish engagements and other events. He has the distinction of performing at the Maryland Irish Festivals since 2006 and through the current 2025 Maryland Irish Festival. He is a proud member of the Ancient Order of Hibernians (AOH) Catonsville, Division 1 Padraic Pearse, and was a prior member of AOH, Division 5, Baltimore City. He is also a proud member of the Police Emerald Society of Baltimore, The Friendly Sons of St. Patrick and participates annually performing our National Anthem and Ireland's National Anthem, "The Soldiers Song." He also performs annually the Anthems at the Annual Wreaths for Fallen Heroes ceremony hosted by Baltimore Police Emerald Society each year.

His business career began as an employee at Johnsons Drug Store, Berwyn, MD through High School and then spent 40 years with Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company/Verizon. In this role, he was assigned as Project Director of a Worldwide Quality Consortium, The QuEST Forum, for which he was awarded as a "Lifetime Fellow" in recognition of outstanding contributions and dedication in pursuit of Global Telecommunications Quality and Performance Excellence.

IT'S A GREAT DAY FOR THE IRISH!

As the grandson of Irish immigrants, I am proud and honored to serve as the Honorary Grand Marshal of the 2026 Baltimore St Patrick Parade.

James White was born in Baltimore City in 1960, the youngest of 5 boys to Thomas and Kathleen Kinsella White. At a young age, they moved to the Cub Hill area of Baltimore County. Although living in the county, the family still traveled each day to school at Blessed Sacrament on Old York Road; their family parish. James graduated from elementary school at St. Mary's Govans then attended Calvert Hall and Towson State University graduating with a degree in Mass Communications.

Although having a Communications degree in Public Relations and Special Events, James started working in the Restaurant industry in High School. He has worked at several Baltimore and Ocean City, Maryland restaurants over the years. For the past 27 years he has worked as a Restaurant Manager at Red Brick Station Restaurant and Brew Pub in White Marsh, MD.

James' Irish roots stem from his mother's side of the family. His maternal grandparents, Patrick Kinsella from County Wicklow; Mary Moran from County Galway immigrated to the United States where they met and married. They settled in the 10th Ward in the parish of St. John the Evangelist. The organization is now known as St. John's Old Tenth Ward which is how James got his first start in the Baltimore Irish Community.

After living many years in Ocean City, he still resides part time in Berlin, MD. James moved back to Baltimore and started volunteering at St. John's Old Tenth Ward events. He has been instrumental in organizing and supporting all events for over 20 years. As a result, James helped St. John's Old Tenth Ward (since our inception in 1966), donate over \$500,000 to St. Elizabeth Special Education School. James has served as Vice President of St. John's Old Tenth Ward for many years. James has been instrumental in the planning and implementation of our fundraising efforts, including the St. John's parade fundraiser and organizing the yearly bus for the parade.

James is known throughout the Irish community in Baltimore and the surrounding areas; as a result, he has served many roles in other organizations. Including a tenure on the board of the Irish Festival and the Irish American Museum (formerly Irish Railroad Workers Museum). He also is a driving force at the festival, as he organizes the St. John's stew and champ booth. One of his favorite responsibilities is acting as cross bearer and lector at the annual festival Mass. As a member of the Emerald Isle Club, he also serves as a lector at the Emerald Isle Club Annual Memorial Mass.

In 2006, James represented St. John's as Deputy Marshal in The Baltimore St. Patrick Parade and in 2007, he represented Irish Charities of MD as Deputy Marshal. Now as Honorary Grand Marshal, he is proud to represent St. John's 10th Ward and his large Irish family both here in Baltimore and those still residing in Ireland.

Baltimore's Irish Catholic community, and the city in general, has benefitted immensely from the efforts of **Women Religious**, i.e. **Nuns or Sisters**. Many religious orders dedicated themselves to the spiritual, medical and educational needs of waves of immigrants to the city, including the Oblate Sisters of Providence, "the first successful Roman Catholic sisterhood in the world established by women of African descent". The Sisters of Charity played an essential role in Baltimore's earliest years, educating thousands in Baltimore's earliest parishes. These Nuns cared for the Irish arriving on coffin ships. Some laid down their lives after contracting ship's fever from the new arrivals. Their nursing saved many, and the Sister's efforts in parish classrooms helped transition formerly rural Irish into educated, capable contributors in a vibrant urban setting.

West Baltimore's St. Peter the Apostle Catholic Church and schools placed an Irish order of Nuns to begin the 1855 school year. Archbishop Kenrick contacted the Diocese of Pittsburgh, requesting members of the **Sisters of Mercy**, a Dublin based order with its first American posting there, to take over St. Peter's Female School. The community was established by Sister Mary Catherine McAuley in 1831 in Dublin, Ireland. They arrived in Baltimore June 28, 1855, led by Reverend Mother M. Catherine Wynne.

A neighboring building (*pictured below*) was purchased by Mrs. Emily Caton MacTavish, the favorite granddaughter of Charles Carroll of Carrollton, and presented a gift to the Order. The **Convent of the Immaculate Conception** became a home for nuns, support staff and future novitiates. Seeing the multitude of young girls seeking an education, Mother Wynne exclaimed, "There must be well nigh a thousand in that crowd!". Thankfully she had been accompanied to Baltimore by Sisters M. Neri Bowen, Mary Colette O'Connor and Mary Anne Rigney. Many of their charges lacked any semblance of formal education. The nuns gathered their pupils in the church hall and did their best to form them into class groups without benefit of walls between them. Some classes were held on elevated platforms and students were moved to the next grade level based on behavior and aptitude, not age. These girls were described by the Sisters as "listless and lawless", but slowly assumed better demeanors.

The Academy of our Lady of Mercy, was opened by the Sisters that same year for girls from wealthy families that could afford to pay tuition. Courses in music, needlework and fine art were offered. The Sisters also separately established a home for distressed women, known as the **House of Mercy**. Poor families of the parish also benefitted from the Sisters' distribution of food collected at the end of the day from Hollins Market.




Several religious Orders adjusted their priorities during the Civil War. Two of those earliest Nuns, Sisters M. Colette O'Connor (*pictured above with military officers*) and M. Anne Rigney, joined 22 other Sisters of Mercy Nuns at Douglas Memorial Hospital in Washington D.C. to care for the wounded. They have been remembered on Washington D.C.'s "Nuns of the Battlefield" memorial.

After the war, the Sisters of Mercy continued educating the young girls of West Baltimore. **The Female School** met in the church basement until 1869, when a school building of six classrooms was added behind the convent. Attendance grew and their good work was an example to many neighborhood girls, encouraging many to join them once their initial years of education were complete.

Among them was Ann Liberty, the future Sister Mary Rita Liberty (*pictured*), baptized at St. Peter's Church in 1868 and a niece of James and Sarah Feeley whose 918 Lemmon Street home is now the Irish American Museum. Ann studied under the Sisters of Mercy at St. Peter's Female School. She entered religious life and taught at Mount Saint Agnes College (established by the Sisters in 1878) in Mount Washington. She returned to St. Peter's School in 1910, teaching boys and girls. She became Mother Superior at St. Vincent's Male Orphanage. Sister Liberty also taught at both Gonzaga School in Washington, D.C., and Sacred Heart Convent in Mount Washington. She died November 25, 1922, at the age of 54.



Teresa Julia Holbein (*pictured*) also grew up near St. Peter's Female School. She followed an older sister into the Sisters of Mercy order in 1905. Becoming **Sister Mary Hildegard Holbein**, she traveled two different vocational tracks: an educator and a nurse. She did several stints as a teacher at St. Peter's Female School. She served primarily at Baltimore's 375-bed Mercy Hospital as a Nurse and Instructor for 43 years. Her time was interrupted briefly in 1943 by a placement at St. Martin de Porres Maternity Hospital in Mobile, Alabama: a modest five-bed facility where she served as supervisor and midwife for five years. Her experiences there enriched her life, and she encouraged other Nuns to become "pioneer workers" in similar settings, giving care to "Miniatures of Christ in Ebony". She passed away in 1977.

FINDING MY IRISH FAMILY



Have you ever wondered where your family really came from and longed to find the answer? Perhaps you've heard a story about one of your ancestors who came to America and established a new life here. Based on recent U.S. Census records over 30 million Americans claim Irish ancestry. However, it is a lucky few who have been able to trace their family's history and then actually journey to the exact location of their origin. No matter what your heritage may be, that personal experience has meaning beyond measure. By taking that journey you become the bridge between the past and the present. You can also become the keeper of the flame: the person who keeps the family history alive. Believe me, that's a mighty role. This essay highlights such an experience.

In my case, both sides of my family are of Irish descent, but growing up I knew very little about the life of my ancestors. No one had ever conducted a proper genealogical search or travelled to Ireland. However, as I got older I developed a burning desire to find out more. The big breakthrough came when I inherited a box that served as a repository for my family's history; the plethora of items in the box covered four generations. Among the items were photographs, birth certificates, deeds, rosaries, mass cards and four letters from Ireland. The letters were dated from 1899 to 1906. When I began to read the letters to myself it was like the roof fell in on my head! Here was the key to unlock my family's past! Strangely enough, it felt as though the letters were just waiting for me to find them.

The recipient of the letters was my maternal great-grandmother Fannie McIntyre who was living in Baltimore, Maryland. All four letters were written by her sister Hannah. There was such grace in her language and the cursive writing made Hannah's words come alive. To my amazement the heading in the first letter dated June 11, 1899 contained the sender's post office: Belturbet. And in that same letter Hannah mentions the names of all their siblings and she informs Fannie how each one is doing. In the second letter dated July 12, 1903 she mentions a place named Derrykerrib twice which made me suspect that it could be the location of the original family homestead.



The letters were a portal into Ireland's past when tenant farmers were still living under a feudal landlord system which provided them little security or rights. At one point Hannah states: "We have a great deal of wages to pay. Everyone is busy to meet the landlord." She also discloses that many members of their family made the decision to emigrate to America. This is understandable since there was no real promise of a positive future for Irish Catholics. Though short in length, these four letters spoke volumes about my ancestors' lives, and it dawned on me that the letters could serve as a blueprint for an earnest investigation in Ireland.

So equipped with my camera and tape recorder I embarked on my venture. This was the summer of 1990, before the World Wide Web and Internet were made accessible to the public, so you had to be very resourceful in order to launch a search. That's why, after landing in Dublin I paid a visit to the Valuation Office. There I learned about Griffith's Primary Valuation of Tenements, the historic record used by genealogists. It provides researchers with names of townlands (the smallest unit of land division in Ireland) and the name of each occupier and immediate lessor. Next, I made my way to Belturbet to explore the town from which Hannah's letter was mailed. Located in County Cavan, this lovely old-fashioned rural town, is situated just a few miles south of the border with Northern Ireland. To become familiar with the area I

purchased an ordinance survey map in a shop. As luck would have it, I spotted the word Derrykerrib; it was one of the many islands that were part of Upper Lough Erne.

While in Belturbet I established my headquarters at a friendly B&B and I received assistance from other members of the community: a postman provided directions to the island of Derrykerrib, and the local parish priest explained some of the idioms that were used in the letters. Suddenly things were coming into focus. I had figured out that Derrykerrib was also an example of a townland and my intuition told me that the island was the key piece to this puzzle. And like a good detective I thought to myself: "Ok, the game is afoot!"

My drive to the island entailed traveling from north Cavan into County Fermanagh, which is part of Northern Ireland. Along the route I saw lovely lakes, gorgeous landscapes and the ruins of a castle. In addition, I encountered a British checkpoint. This unsettling experience left me a little rattled, but more importantly made me realize the harsh reality that confronted the Irish daily living in this area. It would be another eight years before the removal of such border checkpoints would be addressed by the Good Friday Agreement. After being cleared at the checkpoint by the soldiers I pressed on to my destination.

To reach the island of Derrykerrib I had to cross what appeared to be a very old wooden bridge. I later learned the bridge was erected in 1939 and that before the bridge was built the island's inhabitants travelled to and from the mainland of Fermanagh by way of a boat called a cot. The cot ferried children to their school, transported livestock and was even used during funerals. The island itself was composed of 500 acres and was dotted with a dozen houses. In short order I met an islander who suggested I go talk with the Donohues, a family that had lived in Derrykerrib for generations. With great anticipation I arrived at their charming thatched cottage where I was greeted by hydrangea and fuchsia shrubs as I passed through their gate. It was like something out of a storybook.

The next thing I knew I was sitting with a cup of tea in my hand engaged in deep conversation with the two Donohue brothers John and Tosh; John's wife Mary was also present. The earthy scent from the turf burning stove filled the air of the cozy room. There was something noble about these people who welcomed me into their home without hesitation. They seemed to possess a dignity and intelligence that comes with years of working the land. And so with my foreign American accent I commenced to read the letters aloud. There was silence in the room until I finished. Smiles appeared on their faces as they told me I had found my family. Their grandfather John was my great-grandmother Fannie's brother. The gravity of the moment was not lost on me. The improbable became reality: a family separated for nearly a century was united once again. From this small island in County Fermanagh to the streets of Baltimore, it was clear that my family was part of the Irish diaspora.

On subsequent summer visits to Fermanagh, John and Tosh shared with me more family history and sometimes shepherded me to sites on Derrykerrib where other ancestors once lived. They also introduced me to additional relatives living on and off the island and these new cousins in turn broadened my family's story. And at one stage my cousin Thomas arranged for me to have a photography exhibition at the library in Enniskillen, Fermanagh's largest town. The exhibition documented my family's history, my homecoming in 1990 and the beauty of the Lough Erne area. It was a dream come true to see all my friends and relatives gathering at the opening reception of the exhibit. In many ways finding my Irish family has been like a gift that keeps on giving and by connecting with my Irish past I have discovered who I really am.
